MADISON COUNTY OPPORTUNITY ZONES

MADISON COUNTY, MS (APRIL 16, 2018) - The U.S. Department of Treasury has designated three census tracts in Madison County, MS as Qualified Opportunity Zones to spur economic growth. The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act authorized the governor of each U.S. state and territory to nominate a certain number of qualifying census tracts as "Opportunity Zones." Mississippi's designations were officially confirmed Tuesday, April 10th, by the Treasury Department, which administers the program.

The Madison County Economic Development Authority (MCEDA), along with Madison County municipalities within eligible census tracts, nominated tracts for Governor Bryant's consideration and recommendation to the U.S. Department of Treasury for the Opportunity Zone designation.


Joseph P. Deason, Executive Director of Madison County Economic Development said, "These three tracts, one in Ridgeland and two in Canton, will provide our communities the ability to attract private investment to encourage economic development in the form of jobs and assist neighborhood revitalization. We are all excited and look forward to receiving the next round of information concerning the program."

The Ridgeland Opportunity Zone is comprised of the area between South Wheatley Street to Old Canton Road (West to East) and Lake Harbour Drive to East County Line Road (North to South).

Mayor Gene McGee of Ridgeland said, "First of all, I would like to thank Governor Bryant for his leadership and designation of the Ridgeland Opportunity Zones. He continued, "We've been looking for opportunities for development and redevelopment in this area. We believe this will help the Northpark Mall area and provide opportunities to develop the land around the area that has been vacant. This is a Win-Win for The City of Ridgeland."

The Canton Opportunity Zones span from Interstate 55 in Canton and end just before Sharon Road (West to East) running along Peace Street and Hwy 16. These tracts are located within the Madison County Healthcare Zone.

Dr. William Truly, Jr., Mayor of Canton said, "The City of Canton is more than ecstatic to be chosen

as one of the communities for the Opportunity Zone. This opportunity allows investors to take a serious look at the City of Canton for economic development. If there's a city that needs economic development, it's the City of Canton. He continued, "We wish to thank MCEDA for serving as a bridge to help us get designated as an Opportunity Zone. The City of Canton is pleased to be chosen by Governor Bryant to receive 2 of the 100 designated Opportunity Zones in Mississippi."

Qualified Opportunity Zones retain this designation for 10 years. Investors can defer tax on any prior gains until no later than December 31, 2026, so long as the gain is reinvested in a Qualified Opportunity Fund, an investment vehicle organized to make investments in Qualified Opportunity Zones. In addition, if the investor

holds the investment in the Opportunity Fund for at least ten years, the investor would be eligible for an increase in its basis equal to the fair market value of the investment on the date that it is sold.

Treasury and the IRS plan to issue additional information on Qualified Opportunity Funds. The additional guidance will address the certification of Opportunity Funds, which are required to have at least 90 percent of fund assets invested in Opportunity Zones. 2018 MISSISSIPPI LEGISLATIVE SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

The 2018 Regular Legislative Session is in the books. There is talk about a Special Session at some point to address funding for roads and bridges, and possibly a state lottery, but as of this writing, Governor Bryant has not issued a call to bring legislators back to Jackson. Now that the dust has settled, there has been a little time to think about some of the measures passed, along with some key unfinished business. Here's a summary of some of the legislation we considered this year:

Significant Measures That Passed

- State budget: The outlook for Mississippi's economy appears to be strengthening. Our unemployment rate remains at or near record lows, and a boost in the economy provided an extra \$56 million for the FY 2019 budget. The total budget totals approximately \$6 billion. We provided small increases for education, Child Protective Services, the Department of Public Health and the Department of Public Safety. The additional funding for DPS will go to address our critical shortage of state medical examiners and to fund a small trooper school. We also set aside two percent of revenues for the state's rainy day fund.
- *House Bill 1649 Bond Bill:* After legislators did not agree on a bond bill in 2017, we passed a measure this year that allocates \$250 million worth of bonds for the following:
- \$50 million to the Local Bridge Repair and Rehabilitation Program (LSBP)
- \$82.5 million for universities
- \$25 million for community colleges
- \$45 million for Ingalls Shipyard
- \$40 million for the Department of Finance and Administration
- Money for loan programs for small cities and counties to assist with sewer and water projects
- Senate Bill 2836 Medicaid "Technical Bill." The law that sets forth many of the technical provisions governing the state's Medicaid program a \$1 billion program was set to sunset this year, so there was a good bit of debate about renewing that law, and improving it to incentivize cost savings while preserving access to care. In the end, we reauthorized the law to include the following provisions:
- Managed care companies must pay the same reimbursement rate as the legislature-set rates for Medicaid;
- Deleted the annual limit on physician visits, home health service visits and the monthly prescription limit;
- Reimbursement for treatment for those experiencing opioid dependency; and
- Reimbursements for OB/GYNs and psychiatrists.
- House Bill 1306 Construction Dispute Resolution Agreements. This bill provides that certain construction agreements that require dispute resolution outside the state or restrict the parties' choice of law shall be void. The new law provides that for construction projects in Mississippi, disputes must be resolved in the state.
- Senate Bill 2526 Administrative Procedures Act. This bill expands on HB1425 from the 2017 Session, which set up the Occupational Licensing Oversight Commission to check occupational licensing regulations and set state policy in favor of less regulation and more economic opportunity. The new bill requires occupational licensing boards to review their rules every three years, and submit a report to the Oversight Commission. Hopefully, this will lead boards to reduce regulatory burdens and enhance free market opportunity.
- House Bill 709 Prescription Drugs Consumer Affordable Alternative Payment Options Act. Pharmacists will now be able to tell patients if their copay exceeds the amount of the medication they are buying.

This will allow consumers to know the most affordable options for their medication.

• Senate Bill 2459 – This new law protects veterans by expanding reemployment protections for military servicemen and veterans. It ensures that a service member or veteran will be restored to his or her previous position after returning from training in another state.

Significant Legislation That Failed:

Most of the thousands of bills that are filed each year do not survive to become law (thank goodness). In fact, one of my bills (among those that died this year), House Bill 347, would provide that the legislature meet only every other year. I'd like to see the legislature convene less, and focus more on key priorities. But I digress. There were some important agenda items that died this year, a point of frustration for me and for many legislators.

Transportation. We continue to work on a plan to increase funding for roads and bridges. Stay tuned; funding infrastructure is a critical issue for economic growth in Mississippi, and Madison County. The House and Senate passed proposals to provide additional funding for roads and bridges, but in the end, only approved a \$50 million bond bill for local bridge repairs. Some of the House proposals include:

- A set aside of state revenue growth of more than two percent for the repair and reconstruction of state, county and municipal roads and bridges;
- A new diversion of 35 percent of the use tax collected by the state to localities for the repair, maintenance and reconstruction of local roads, streets and bridges. Overall, this would mean that approximately \$108 million would be dedicated to improving the state's infrastructure;
- Bonding authority for a number of significant road projects around the state, including \$8 million for the Reunion Parkway; and
- Debt set-off provisions to allow municipalities to collect unpaid fines from the tax refunds of those who owe them. The City of Ridgeland, for example, has about \$7 million in unpaid balances, half of which would go to the state, if collected.

Education Funding Formula. The House passed a significant overhaul of the current education funding formula, but the bill died in the Senate. House Bill 957 was based on a series of recommendations from the consulting group EdBuild. The proposed formula based school funding on student enrollment and student needs. HB 957 also included significant transparency, and a process to roll back bureaucracy and regulations to allow our schools more flexibility and innovation. The bill expressly gave local control to districts in spending education tax dollars. For me, "the way we have always done it," and "throwing more money at the problem," are not answers. Instead, we should consider sensible reform that targets education funding in a more equitable and straightforward way, puts money into the classroom, and incentivizes strong performance like we have seen in Madison County public schools.

BP Settlement Funds. Another unresolved issue is how to allocate the \$750 million BP settlement. These funds represent economic damages payments as a result of the 2010 Deepwater Horizon oil spill and will be paid over 17 years. Coast lawmakers want the money reserved for projects on the Coast, but some upstate lawmakers want funding allocated across the state. Several proposals were debated during the Session, but no agreement was reached.

A Lottery. Though it garnered a good bit of attention, all bills that would have established a state lottery died in committee. One amendment to an appropriation bill to require a state lottery to be established passed the House by a voice vote, but was later removed in conference. With the legalization of sports betting by the U.S. Supreme Court looming large in Mississippi, it's a safe bet that the lottery will also continue to be debated.
